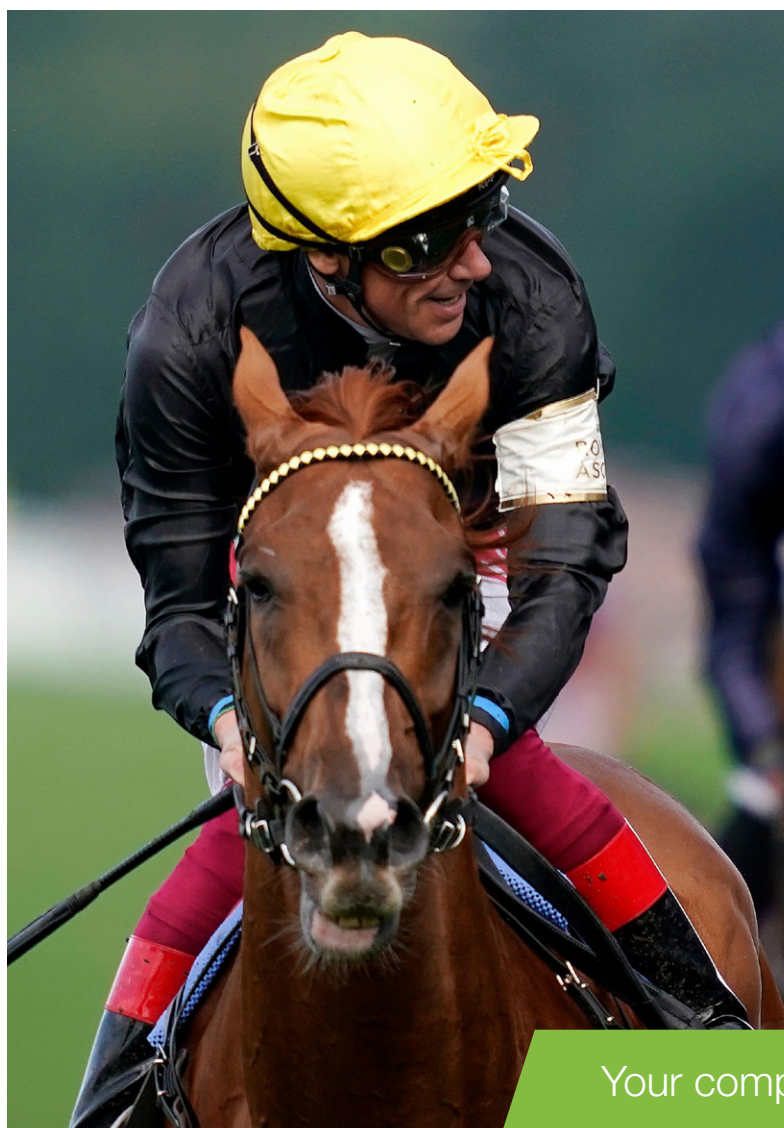

THE QUEEN ANNE STAKES

The Group 1 Queen Anne Stakes kicks off the Royal Ascot festival and currently we have a short-priced favourite in Palace Pier, and with some justification after winning the Bet365 mile at Sandown. On the eye, it was an impressive 8-length victory and he quickened up well from 2f out. However this result was arguably somewhat flattering due to the pace collapse and the under-performance of Happy Power and Khuzaam. It was the 28/1 shot Bless Him who finished second, while the other market rivals really disappointed, so it might be worth steering clear of the 7/4 top price.

This presents an opportunity for some each way prospects, and there appears to be much more value in backing Lope Y Fernandez at an each way price than Palace Pier at win-only odds.

The performance of Lope Y Fernandez in the Heritage Stakes at Leopardstown in April seems the best piece of form this year on British or Irish soil.

That was just his third start over a mile after having placed in his previous two starts in the Irish 2000 Guineas and the Breeders Cup Mile. In a recent interview, Aiden O'Brien admitted they didn't work out the best trip for this horse until after the Breeders Cup, and now realise they are an out-and-out mile prospect.

It looks to be the trainer's best chance in the race and he is the leading trainer in the race over the last 20 years with 4 victories.

- 6 of the last 12 winners were favourite and 10 were in the top 3 in the betting
- 6 of the last 12 winners won on their previous run
- 10 of the last 12 winners ran within the last 31 days
- 7 of the last 12 winners had at least 1 previous run at Ascot, and 7 of the 7 had a previous win at Ascot

ANTE-POST TIP: 1pt each way Lope Y Fernandez

THE KING'S STAND STAKES

The Kings Stand Stakes is the second Group 1 of the festival and it's a great race for the sprinters over the minimum distance of 5 furlongs.

7-year-old Battaash heads the market after winning the race last season for the first time after finishing second twice behind Blue Point in 2018/19. This will be his first outing since winning the Nunthorpe last August at York, and after suffering a small fracture during the winter, Charlie Hills has recently given positive news for a return at Royal Ascot.

The problem also is the form of Glass Slippers, who has definitely improved in his 4-year-old season. He finished fifth in this race last season, five lengths behind Battaash, who did the same again at Goodwood, albeit by only two lengths on that occasion. Since then, Glass Slippers has gone on to win two races.

From a betting perspective it's really hard to choose between the two, which somewhat reduces their appeal at their current prices.

With the front two in the market hard to separate, that adds to the value of Liberty Beach at 12/1 each way. This horse finished third in the race last season having gone off at 4/1 SP and appears to be less exposed than the market principals. He crossed paths with Battaash and Glass Slippers on a few occasions last season and in their final race of the season finished third by a nose in the same race that Glass Slippers finished second.

12 Year Stats: The King's Stand Stakes

- 10 of the last 12 winners were aged 4-6.
- 2 of the last 12 winners were favourite, 8/12 winners were in the top 3 in the betting
- 2 horses have won this race twice in the last 12 years: Blue Point (2018/19) and Sole Power (2013/14)
- 6 from 12 winners won on their last run and 8 winners at least placed
- 9 of the last 12 winners had their last run within 66 days
- All of the last 12 winners had at least 4 previous flat wins
- Of the last 12 winners, 4 were bred in both Great Britain and 4 in Ireland

ANTE-POST TIP: **Liberty Beach 1pt each way**

ST JAMES'S PALACE STAKES

The 3-year-olds go to post for the St James's Palace Stakes and the market is currently headed by the top three for the 2,000 Guineas. Poetic Flare was somewhat a shock 16/1 winner on the day. Jim Bolger has indicated this is their main target and it might be worth noting that the sire of Poetic Flare (Dawn Approach) won this race back in 2013.

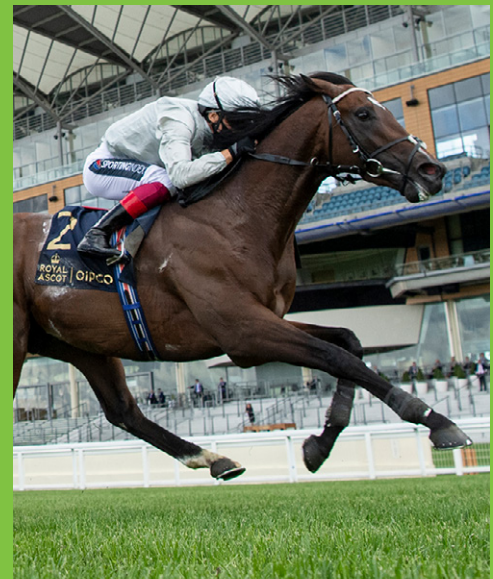
Master of the Seas finished second in the 2000 Guineas and of the front three I would upgrade the performance of this horse the most. They were held up in the Guineas and made great headway from around halfway and just failed to get past Poetic Flare. In that race the pace did hold up with most of the prominent racers finishing best, so Master of the Seas performed really well to come from behind.

Lucky Vega finished third in that race and considering that was their first run since last September it was a great training performance from Jessica Harrington. They ran a little keenly in the early stages but after settling, he **travelled well and stayed on well towards the finish**, also closing in on the front two.

From a punting perspective, Poetic Flare and Master of the Seas seem a little short at 4/1 now and of the three I would have to recommend Lucky Vega at 7/1 instead.

12 Year Stats: St. James's Palace Stakes

- 7 of the last 12 winners have been favourites
- 10 of the last 12 winners have been in the top 3 in the betting
- 7 of the last 12 winners won on their last run before the St James's Palace Stakes, and 10 winners had their last run within the last 26 days
- 5 of the last 12 winners ran in the Irish 2000 Guineas (Curragh) on their last run, 4 of the 5 won, 1 placed
- 7 of the last 12 winners had at least 1 previous group 1 win
- No horse has won this race more than once in the last 12 years; the most recent winner was Palace Pier in 2020
- Of the last 12 winners, 6 were bred in Ireland and 6 in Great Britain

LORD NORTH AHEAD IN THE
2020 RACE

John and Thady Gosden and Aiden O'Brien have won 4 of the last 10 renewals of this race and they both have a strong hand with Lord North and Love heading up the ante-post market.

Lord North is the current market favourite at a best price of 9/4 and **won the race last year in impressive fashion**, beating Addeybb by four lengths.

Love does hold an entry in the Queen Anne too, but they are much shorter for this race so it looks like we will get a match-up between the two stable stars. Love is the superstar filly for Aiden O'Brien's yard now that Magical is retired and the potential for this 4-year-old is huge after her achievements so far. After an unbeaten season last year, winning the Guineas, the Oaks and the Yorkshire Oaks, it's going to be fascinating to see how she does now as a 4-year-old.

These two horses are particularly difficult to oppose and from a betting perspective they are not really appealing at the prices. Alternative value might be found further down the market and another Aiden O'Brien mount makes some each way appeal. Over ten furlongs, **Broome is unbeaten in five starts and deserves some respect** in this race and certainly makes some appeal at a best price of 14/1.

12 Year Stats: Prince of Wales's Stakes

- All of the last 12 winners were aged 4 or 5
- 3 of the last 12 winners were favourite
- 11 of the last 12 winners were in the top 3 in the betting
- 8 of the last 12 winners won on their last run and 10 at least placed
- Jockey James Doyle has had the most success here with 3 wins, including the most recent win with Lord North in 2020
- 7 winners returned an SP between 3/1 and 16/1
- Of the last 12 winners, 5 were bred in both Great Britain and 5 in Ireland

ASCOT GOLD CUP



3-TIME WINNER STRADIVARIUS

The Gold Cup inevitably centres on whether Stradivarius can make it four in a row and equal the record set by Yeats. He returned at the end of April to win the Sagaro Stakes in comfortable fashion and is not scheduled for another run before the Gold Cup. The horse stays really well and has a fantastic turn of foot over a staying trip and it's a **deadly combination** that nobody has been able to live with for the last 3 years. At a best price of 6/4 it does not appear to be a price worth getting stuck into, so it is worth looking for some **each way value** further down the market.

Mark Johnston heads the opposition, with Subjectivist and Sir Ron Priestley both offering single figure prices in the race. Subjectivist took a big step forward with a career best at Meydan in March, winning the Dubai Gold Cup really well by six lengths. He stayed on over the 2-mile trip and there could be more to come stepping up to 2m 4f here.

Sir Ron Priestley has returned after coming second in the 2019 St Leger, winning two races this season so far. Both were won fairly comfortably and being a strong stayer as well, Mark Johnston has an exciting prospect here.

12 Year Stats: Gold Cup

- 11 of the last 12 winners were age 4-6
- 8 of the last 12 winners were favourite
- 9 of the last 12 winners were in the top 3 in the betting
- Aidan O'Brien is the leading trainer with four wins (all different horses), then John Gosden has three wins

- Of the last 12 winners, 6 were bred in Ireland and 3 in Great Britain

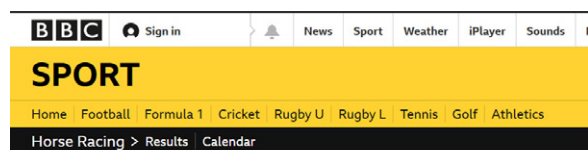

History of Ascot and Royal Ascot

Royal Ascot Week is an iconic event held at Ascot Racecourse in June each year. A chance to impress in all your finery, this three hundred year old event attended by the Queen began life in 1711.

Ascot Racecourse is situated in Berkshire and was founded by Queen Anne in 1711. Queen Anne, as with our Queen Elizabeth today, was a keen horsewoman and the first race at Ascot was "Her Majesty's Plate" held on 11th August 1711. Seven horses competed for a prize of 100 guineas (which today would be around £10.5k). In 2019, the total prize money is estimated to be over £7.3 million, with the summer highlight "King George" race enjoying a £1.25 million prize. That first race comprised of three separate four mile heats. Today, Royal Ascot week features eight Group One races and nineteen Group races in total. Sadly, no record was kept of that very first winner at Ascot back in 1711, so we can only imagine what the name of that horse may have been!

It is surprising to know that from its creation in 1711 up until 1945 the only racing that took place at Ascot was the Four Day Royal Event. Since 1945, additional fixtures have been added to the racecourse, notably the addition of National Hunt racing in 1965. The National Hunt course was created using turf from Hurst Park Racecourse which closed in 1962.

On 26th September 2004, Ascot closed for a period of twenty months to allow a grand redevelopment project worth £185 million, to take place. What happened to the Royal Ascot event in 2005 you might be thinking? Well it did take place, but it was held at York racecourse instead. A spectacular occasion for the City of York and one that was later described by the Duke of Devonshire as "one of the most significant racing events in living memory, something very special and a moment of history".

Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II reopened Ascot racecourse on Tuesday 20 June 2006, but there was some criticism about the new grandstand. The grandstand was deemed to be insufficiently raised to allow patrons proper viewing of the racing. A further £10 million investment was announced at the end of 2009 with alterations allowing improved viewing from the lower levels of the Grandstand.

The Royal Ascot Event

Over the years the horses making the headlines at Royal Ascot have had an increasingly international flavour with representation from USA, Australia and Hong Kong. The majority of trainers are still from the UK and Ireland though.

From its inception in 1768 up until 2002, Royal Ascot was a four day event. In 2002 it was increased to five days in

celebration of the Queen's Golden Jubilee.

Not only is this a key event in the horse racing calendar but also in the social calendar. Over three hundred thousand people attend one of the three enclosures, with the Royal Enclosure naturally being the most prestigious!

The famous Ascot Gold Cup was introduced in 1807, and it was this key event that was really the making of the Royal Ascot event. Winners have been recorded since 1807, right from the first "Master Jackey" through to the 2018 winner Stradivarius. Since 1807, the race has run every year except for 1915/16 and 1940 and during wartime years 1917-18 and 1941-44 the cup race was run at Newmarket. The Gold Cup runs on the Thursday (Ladies' Day!), which is thought by many to be the main day of the event.

There will always be a strong link between Ascot and the Monarchy because it was established by a ruling Monarch on Crown property. In recognition of this, the Queen Anne Stakes is still run on the first day of Royal Ascot.

For those lucky enough to be a winning owner of the Gold Cup you will be presented with a gold trophy, traditionally by the ruling Monarch, which is yours to keep. The same goes for the Queen's Vase (in commemoration of the coronation of Queen Victoria) and the Royal Hunt Cup (introduced in 1843).

Winning owners of the remaining races are presented with a Challenge Trophy, which is returned to Ascot to be presented to their successor the following year.

The longevity of the Royal Ascot event was secured in 1813 when the Act of Enclosure was passed by Parliament to entrust the heathland (along with Windsor Forest) into the ownership of the Crown with one proviso - that it would be retained as a racecourse for public use, stating: "which piece of Ground shall be kept and continued as a Racecourse for the Public Use at all times, as it has usually been." This ensures that it should be an event we can all enjoy for years to come.

This is a truly historic annual event with all the pomp, tradition and excitement you might expect of a Royal event, and of course the chance to see some of the best horses in the world in action. If you ever get the chance to attend, it is something you should definitely experience.

The Commonwealth Cup looks a tricky puzzle to solve at this stage with 53 runners currently having entries. It's currently a case of figuring out where the horses will go and what will be their main targets, either here or elsewhere.

Campanelle is the current market favourite at a best price of 7/1, and as this is their only entry at Royal Ascot, we can be pretty sure that this is their targeted race for the meeting.

He won the Queen Mary Stakes last year at Ascot as a 2-year-old in impressive fashion over five furlongs, since when further success in the Darley Prix Morny at Deauville over 6f last August in Group 1 company rightfully puts him towards the front of the market. A fourth place at Keeneland over a mile at the Breeders Cup meeting in November added to his reputation, but the sprint trips are definitely his optimum distance at present.

One horse that does catch the eye is Dragon Symbol. He is **unbeaten in 4 starts** after winning three times over six furlongs on the all-weather and won last time out on his turf debut at Hamilton over five furlongs.

He is entered in the Kings Stand too, but the jockey did say they are more likely to go for the Commonwealth Cup which would probably be the best option, and give him excellent each way value at 10/1.

Mother Earth heads up the market at 4/1 after having won the 1,000 Guineas at Newmarket. She was given a fantastic ride by Frankie Dettori on the day, but going off at an SP of 10/1 she was definitely Aiden O'Brien's second string behind the much fancied Santa Barbara, who went to post as 5/2 joint favourite.

Santa Barbara is next in the market at 5/1 and given how well she was supported last time you would have to favour this horse going forward. They ran a little green in the closing stages of the Guineas and will definitely learn a lot as it was only their second ever racecourse appearance.

Saffron Beach has to be respected at a current best price of 8/1, given her second place in the Guineas and she finished the race really well too. It was her first try over a mile and her pedigree indicates she's a miler, so there should be more to come at this distance.

At the prices, Santa Barbara still carries each way value at 5/1, and she should come on for the run in the Guineas, giving her more potential than perhaps any other horse in the race.

12 Year Stats: The Coronation Stakes

- 5 of the last 12 winners were favorites
- 8 of the last 12 winners were in the top 3 in the betting
- 7 of the last 12 winners won on their last time out
- 3 of the last 12 winners ran in the 1000 Guineas (Newmarket) on their last run, 2 of the 3 won. And another 3 of the last 12 winners ran in the Irish 1000 Guineas (Curragh) on their last run, 2 of the 3 won
- No horse has won this race more than once in the last 12 years; the most recent winner was Alpine Star
- 8 of the last 12 winners were bred in Ireland, 2 in France, 1 in Great Britain, and 1 in the USA

DIAMOND JUBILEE STAKES

The Diamond Jubilee Stakes rounds off the Group 1 action of Royal Ascot and is run over 6 furlongs for 4-year-olds and above.

Dream of Dreams heads the market at a best priced of 11/2 and hasn't been seen since October when finishing 8th at Ascot in the Sprint Stakes on soft ground. He was beaten by a head in this race last year by Hello Youmzain and also by Blue Point the year before, so maybe they could make it third time lucky. However, he is now a 7-year-old and to win here he will have to buck an established trend that has seen 3-to-5-year-olds win all of the last twelve runnings of this renewal.

At the prices, **the best value appears to rest with Starman at 10/1** – a 4-year-old with bags of potential on decent ground. He finished 14th of 16 last time out at Ascot in the race won by Glen Shiel, but the bottomless ground on that occasion really didn't suit.

His two successes over six furlongs at York and Doncaster on good ground hints at his potential, with the York run in particular putting him firmly in the mix for this race.

- All of the last 12 winners were aged 3-5
- 4 of the last 12 winners were favorites and 8 were in the top 3 in the betting
- 4 of the last 12 winners won last time out
- 9 of the last 12 winners ran in the last 50 days or less
- 11 of the last 12 winners had at least 4 previous runs over 6 furlongs and 10 had at least 1 previous win over 6 furlongs
- James Fanshawe and Aidan O'Brien are the leading trainers here with two wins apiece
- No horse has won the race more than twice in the last 12 years; Hello Youmzain is the most recent winner in 2020
- 8 of the last 12 winner returned an SP between 4/1 and 25/1
- 5 of the last 12 winners were bred in Ireland, 3 in Australia, and 2 in Great Britain
